James 4:11-12 (ESV) 11 Do not speak evil against one another, brothers. The one who speaks against a brother or judges his brother, speaks evil against the law and judges the law. But if you judge the law, you are not a doer of the law but a judge. 12 There is only one lawgiver and judge, he who is able to save and to destroy. But who are you to judge your neighbor?

I. Intro

- A. Recap last week:
 - 1. Humility marks us
 - 2. We are nothing without Christ
 - 3. Humility always comes before exaltation.
- B. Recap further back:
 - 1. The topic was introduce with the challenge to tame the tongue
 - 2. The tongue is a challenge regarding the text today, but where the mind goes, the tongue follows.
 - 3. So as you learn to tame your tongue, you are learning to tame your thought life.
- C. There is a joy in being in right relationship with God and with man.
- D. There is so much instruction about how to handle ourselves regarding other people
- E. So today we are told: not to speak evil against another, and not to judge someone
 - 1. These are related
 - 2. And in context we understand this to mean exactly what it says
 - 3. Our conduct toward others should be marked by the Spirit of Christ.

II. Text

- A. Do not speak evil against one another
 - 1. This is a real problem
 - 2. If you've nothing nice to say, don't say anything.
- B. The one who speaks against a brother or judges his brother
 - 1. Speak evil: a defamer: when you say bad things about others, you are speaking evil
 - 2. Judge: kreeno: to pronounce an opinion concerning right and wrong
 - 3. Leave these things out of your mouth, and eventually, grow to where you leave them out of your mind.
- C. Speaks evil against the law and judges the law. But if you judge, you are no longer a doer, but a judge
 - 1. You have just placed yourself in the position of God by making statements against someone else
 - 2. We must fight against this: The ugly physical reality meets the beautiful spiritual self.
- D. There is only one lawgiver and judge
 - 1. God is the judge
 - 2. He made the rules, understands the rules completely, and became flesh and lived perfectly by the rules.
- E. He who is able to save and to destroy
 - 1. He is all powerful
 - 2. And doesn't answer to us.
- F. But, who are you to judge your neighbor
 - 1. You are not HIM
 - 2. Let HIM be HIM
- III. Points
 - A. Hold fast to truth, but Give grace
 - 1. In essentials, unity, In non essentials, liberty, In all things, charity
 - 2. Often attributed to great theologians such as Augustine, it comes from an otherwise undistinguished German Lutheran theologian of the early seventeenth century, Rupertus Meldenius. The phrase occurs in a tract on Christian unity written (circa 1627) during the Thirty Years War (1618–1648), a bloody time in European history in which religious tensions played a significant role. The saying has found great favor

among subsequent writers such as Richard Baxter, and has since been adopted as a motto by the Moravian Church of North America and the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

- 3. Always remember when handling conflict:
 - a) You are dealing with someone created in the image of God.
 - b) You do not know the whole story or what they have experienced.
 - c) You have been forgiven of much, so also forgive much.
- 4. Make a stand for truth, and always yield to the tenderness of the Holy Spirit at work in you.
 - a) In this stand, recognize you have been a work in progress yourself
 - b) Your conviction and mission have been shaped by life and experience
- 5. So many times we have more grace for someone when we have gone through a similar thing, less grace for someone when we do not understand their struggle.
 - a) This is the reality of our struggle
 - b) And the reason for this warning today.
- B. Fight against the flesh
 - 1. We all have a god complex to battle against
 - 2. We should never assume the role of God
 - 3. When we assume to role of judge, we are stepping outside of our call Christian charity.
 - 4. A retired pastor I spent time with
 - a) would always word things very carefully
 - b) Not wanting to say a negative thing about someone, sometimes he would just not comment
 - c) Other times he would make a general statement regarding the challenge, but not singling anyone out specifically.
 - d) I was so thankful to see and hear his example
 - 5. We should let the word of God speak in any situation
 - 6. We should let the Holy Spirit of God be the one that brings conviction.
 - 7. Love people in the midst of the challenge they are facing, and show them Christ.
- C. Look inwardly before outwardly
 - 1. [Mat 7:1-5 ESV] 1 "Judge not, that you be not judged. 2 For with the judgment you pronounce you will be judged, and with the measure you use it will be measured to you. 3 Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? 4 Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? 5 You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye.
 - 2. The scripture speaks, therefore we should proclaim it to ourselves and believe what is says.
 - 3. How is it, that believers can read this verse and assume its talking about someone else?
 - 4. Think about the transition here:
 - a) Look at your own issues, then help others with theirs.
 - b) Humility before exaltation
 - c) Death before life
 - 5. I challenge you to give much grace when dealing with other people, because you desire much grace for yourself.
 - 6. Also, expect more from your mouth, and your mind will catch up eventually.
 - 7. Honor the LORD in all things, ask Him for the strength to change
